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Christian Motivations - 3 Justifying the Ungodly

grew up in a Missionary Baptist church that used the revival meeting format for its worship service. The service began with the first and last stanzas of favorite gospel songs led by a gregarious "song leader" (these were pre- "worship leader" days). Offering—Special Music—Sermon—Altar Call—Multiple verses of "Just As I Am." The deacons would then go out and have a smoke.

I heard the gospel call to repentance and faith in Christ on *every single Sunday*. Never, not once, not for a moment did I ever believe that one could be saved except through faith in Jesus, apart from any works. That was clear. Good works could never get a person into heaven.

Yet as a teenager I became highly uncomfortable with what I later learned was called "cheap grace" or "easybelievism." Scores of people in our ecclesiastical circle had walked the aisle, prayed the sinner's prayer, were born again and saved, and yet never showed the least sign of authentic Christianity. They were immoral. They had foul mouths. They were drunks. They were mean. They were prideful. Yet they had assurance. Oh yes. They knew they were saved. I may have been a mushy-headed teenager, but I knew something was wrong with that. The real gospel changes people. Too many people weren't changed.

I grew rapidly in my faith during my sophomore and ensing years in college. As I matured, I became even more troubled by cheap-grace evangelicalism, everywhere seen in Southern California. However, I was also devouring my Bible. One day I came to this verse:

But to the one who does not work, but believes in Him who justifies the ungodly, his faith is credited as righteousness, (Rom 4:5, NASB)

I had been bumping into James and "faith without works is dead," heightening my confusion (Jas 2:26). Yet here was the answer. Could the graciousness of the gospel possibly be stated more clearly? "The one who does not work." Works are not only not required, they are excluded. Works are given no consideration, no place, no credit in relation to justification/ salvation. One must "not work," that is, one must not attribute any meritorious value to any good deeds whatsoever. One must only "believe." One must only have "faith" in Jesus Christ, His cross, His atonement, His victorious resurrection, and one is saved.

It gets better. One's faith is in the God who "justifies the ungodly." Who gets justified? The *ungodly*, while still ungodly. They don't first clean up their act, or straighten up their lives, or turn

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over a new leaf. They merely look to Christ and His cross. Though they are still "ungodly," they are "reckoned" or "counted" as "righteousness." They're not righteous. Yet they, the ungodly, though still ungodly, are considered righteous in Christ.

I read this verse to a confused sorority girl at a college social event (a Pi Phi as I recall), pausing on each word: *who* does *not work but believes*, my voice rising with enthusiasm. It's wonderful, isn't it?! Salvation is free. It is a gift. It is all of grace.

The sola fide part of my unrest was nailed down, closed, shut, never to be opened. I wasn't entirely sure of what to do with works considered positively. Jesus says others are to see our "good works" and "glorify your (our) Father in heaven" (Mt 5:16, NASB). We are to be "zealous for good works," says the Apostle (Titus 2:14). Concern about works will have to await another newsletter. Yet, a critical hurdle in understanding had been cleared and the graciousness of the gospel was unshakably grasped, with floods of accompanying gratitude and relief, not to mention motivation to spread the good news around.

Finishing Our Course with Joy

In an earlier review, I wondered why the editor asked a retired grandfather to review a book on pop culture. I have no doubts about why he asked me to review *Finishing Our Course with Joy*. Note the subtitle: *Guidance from God for Engaging with Our Aging*.

Packer begins by suggesting three things that should characterize aging: living for God one day at a time, living in the present moment, and living ready to go when Christ calls.

He contrasts his outlook with that of contemporary culture. The world "prescribes self-indulgence and irresponsibility as the goal of one's declining years" (p. 29). This "agenda as a whole turns out to be a recipe for isolating oneself and trivializing one's life, with apathetic boredom becoming one's default mood day after day" (p. 30).

Packer recognizes the decline in physical functions. As the body ages, it becomes the source of pain and discouragement, which leads seniors to see the body as the opponent of well-being.

As a corrective to this view, the author explains briefly the Bible's view that we are "psychophysical units, embodied souls who are also ensouled bodies" (p. 38).

Originally, body and soul were united forever, but sin came into the world with death as a consequence. As a result, physical decline is a given that sinful pride refuses to accept.

Packer argues that Satan convinces seniors that secular retirement should prevail in the church. He counters that seniors "behave as though spiritual gifts and ministry skills wither with age. But they don't; what happens, rather, is that they atrophy with disease." (p. 64).

The apostle Paul requires us to run the race set before us (1 Cor 9:24-27). The author calls for seniors to rediscover Christian hope as a way to keep on the course God has set for us – "recovering and reappropriating this hope is a prime task for us who are aging today" (p. 84).

One could wish that the author gave more explicit directions on how the church can assist individuals in avoiding being sucked into the cultural vortex of self-centeredness. The book is long on analysis and calls for change, but short on ideas about what seniors can and should do.

I can add my personal testimony to the deep joy and satisfaction that comes to a retired professor whom God has allowed to serve in a number of interim pastorates. My energy level is not what it was when I was twenty-five, but I'm glad I'm not consigned to my rocking chair or golf four days a week. To Packer's thesis I can offer a hearty amen.

"The stone which the builders rejected has become the chief corner stone,"

was cited by Jesus to the chief priests and elders (Matthew 21:42), by Peter before the Sanhedrin (Acts 4:11), and in his first epistle (1 Peter 2:7,8), in each case identifying Jesus as the rejected stone which became the corner stone.

In addition the multitudes cried out verses 25 and 26 on Palm Sunday as Jesus entered Jerusalem,

"Hosanna to the Son of David, Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest!" (Matthew 21:9) This Psalm was often a favorite of Christian armies and monarchs, especially in times of battle. It was sung by the army of William of Orange when he landed at Torbay, en route to the English throne in the Glorious Revolution of 1688, and in a service conducted by William Castares (1649-1715), a leading minister of the Church of Scotland.

Luther said of the 118th:

"This is my psalm, my chosen psalm. I love them all; I love all Holy Scripture, which is my consolation and my life. But this psalm is nearest my heart, and I have a familiar right to call it mine. It has saved me from many a pressing danger, from which nor emperor, nor kings, nor sages, nor saints could have saved me. It is my friend, dearer to me than all the honours and power of the earth."

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MARCH FOR LIFE 2015

Thad been pretty vocal about not attending the March this year. However, the prompting of the Holy Spirit would not allow me to be at peace with that decision. I am forever grateful.

"Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, ensure justice for those being crushed." —Proverbs 31:8

As our bus approached Washington, D.C. early on the morning of January 22, our driver pointed out places of interest. Passing the Pentagon and seeing the portion of the wall that had been replaced reminded us of the reality of how vulnerable we are as a nation. The crowd this year seemed larger than ever. According to statistics, over 80% of those in attendance were under the age of 30. Truly this is the 'Pro-Life Generation.'
