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Our Christian Identity Subjects

am so proud of my heretofore undiscovered ability to alliterate: sons, servants, sinners, sojourners, siblings, soldiers, and now subjects. We are subjects of our Lord and King. Fundamental to Christian conversion is the receiving of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. He is not received as Savior now, and sometime, maybe, later received as Lord. This dual-decision way of constructing the Christian life, popularized in the mid-twentieth century, has been utterly discredited in recent years, and rightly so. The Apostle Paul in one of his clearest descriptions of conversion speaks of it as believing in the heart that God raised Jesus from the dead and "confess(ing) with your mouth that Jesus is Lord" (Rom 10:9). Likewise, the Apostle Peter concluded his powerful Pentecost sermon with a declaration of Lordship:

Let all the house of Israel therefore know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified. (Acts 2:36)

What must we do to be saved? "Believe in the *Lord* Jesus, and you will be saved" (Acts 16:31). What will every tongue confess? "That Jesus Christ is *Lord*" (Phil 2:11). Faith is in the *Lord* Jesus Christ. Conversion may even be understood as a response to a sovereign command. The Apostle Paul preached at Athens,

The times of ignorance God overlooked, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent. (Acts 17:30)

Because He is Lord, He "commands" repentance. He doesn't merely suggest it, or even request it. His disciples are those who obey that command, repent, and submit to His rule.

Kingdom of God

The central theme of Jesus' teaching ministry was the coming of God's kingdom or reign, in Him. It was on this note that He began preaching:

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came into Galilee, proclaiming the gospel of God and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel." (Mk 1:14, 15; cf Mt 4:17)

His *message* was that of the arrival of the kingdom (Lk 17:20-37). His *ethics*, as in the Sermon on the Mount, were the ethics of the kingdom (Mt 5-7). His *parables* were the parables of the kingdom (Mk 4; Mt 13). His *miracles* were the evidence of the presence of the kingdom (Mt 12:28). His mission was and is to bring sinners into His kingdom and under His rule. On the one hand, the Apostle Paul can summarize his message as "nothing...except Jesus Christ and Him crucified" (1 Cor 2:2). On the other hand, he can also

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summarize it saying, 'what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as *Lord*" (2 Cor 4:5; cf Col 1:28). Again, he can summarize his message as "testify(ing) to the gospel of the grace of God." Yet he can also describe it as "proclaiming the kingdom" (Acts 20:24, 25). Luke summarized the Apostle Paul's message while under house arrest in Rome as

proclaiming the kingdom of God and teaching about the Lord Jesus Christ with all boldness and without hindrance. (Acts 28:31; cf Acts 28:23)

The King

Jesus is King. By faith and repentance we became His subjects. He is "the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords" (1 Tim 6:15). He is not only the supreme Being, but the supreme Governor and Lawgiver (Jas 4:12 cf Isa 53:22). He is "the great King above all gods (Ps 95:3, 5). He is "the Lord of heaven and earth (Acts 17:24). Our God is "a great King over all the earth." He "reigns over the nations" and "sits on his holy throne" (Ps 47:2, 8 cf. Ps 97:1ff). The believer, as a subject of Almighty God, enjoys what William Gurnall, in his classic, The Christian in Complete Armour, calls "the sweet government of Jesus Christ."

King's commands

The Christian identity as "subject" is highlighted in 2 John 4-6.

"I rejoiced greatly to find some of your children walking in the truth, just as we were commanded by the Father. And now I ask you, dear lady—not as though I were writing you a new commandment, but the one we have had from the beginning—that we love one another. And this is love, that we walk according to his commandments; this is the commandment, just as you have heard from the beginning, so that you should walk in it."

Note the prominent role played by the word "commandment" (entole) in these verses. The word "commandment" or "commanded" occurs four times in these three verses. "The Christian life," says John Stott, "is here viewed from the

standpoint of commandments." Who are we? We are subjects who obey our Lord's commands.

Most of us would be unlikely to follow the Apostle's example of describing the Christian life in terms of commandments to obey. We are right to fear misunderstanding. We are right to fear legalism. Many, many people wrongly view Christianity as no more than a list of "do's and don'ts." They see it as no more than a collection of rules, of things required and things forbidden. They miss the big picture. Christianity is a religion of grace. We are saved by faith not works; by grace not law; and by Christ not religious performance. Salvation is a gift God gives, not a wage that we earn (Rom 6:23; Eph 2:8, 9).

How about once we're saved? What next? Even then the Christian life doesn't become rule-driven. We respond to the gift of salvation with gratitude. We want to honor and serve so gracious a God. It is the "love of Christ" that "constrains" (NASB) or "controls" us (2 Cor 5:14). Christ loves us and we, in response, want to please Him. Indeed, it is our ambition (2 Cor 5:9). Gratitude motivates our service and obedience. We want to know God and enjoy His fellowship, finding that of "surpassing value" (Phil 3:8-10). Consequently, we engage in those things that promote that fellowship (e.g. Bible reading, prayer, attendance at public services) and avoid those things that inhibit it (sin in all its forms). The "those things" are just the details, not oppressive duties or burdensome commandments (1 Jn 5:3).

The Christian life is basically simple. We want to please our Creator Father and His Savior Son. We are not attempting to earn the favor of God, which is impossible. Our motive arises not from what we are obligated to do, but from what God has already done for us in Christ.

Still, the Apostle John is not shy about describing the whole Christian life as a life of subjects of our Lord who obey His commands. The Christian life may rightly and properly be described in terms of such. We are commanded to *believe*. The Apostle John urges us to "walk" in the "truth" as "commanded by the Father" (2 Jn 4). We are commanded to

behave as well. Love, normally an attitude of the heart, is viewed by the Apostle as a commandment (2 Jn 5). He repeats himself, in case we missed the point: "walk according to his commandments" (2 Jn 6b).

Obedience of faith

Maybe this way of discussing the Christian life is not so unusual. The Apostle Paul can summarize his gospel as "obedience of faith," which he does twice (Rom 1:5; 16:26), and can speak of conversion as "slaves of sin" becoming "obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which we were committed" (Rom 6:17). Likewise, Luke describes the conversion of many of Jerusalem's priests in similar language. They "became obedient to the faith (Acts 6:7). Jesus even mingles the language of "works" with "faith." "This is the work of God," he says, "that you believe in him whom he has sent" (Jn 6:29). His disciples are those who hear Jesus' words and do them (Lk 6:46, 47; 8:21; 11:28). The last book in the Bible repeats twice that they are blessed who "hear" the words of its prophesy and "keep what is written" (Rev 1:3; 22:7). The "offspring" of the woman of Revelation 12 (i.e. the church), that is, members of the church, are characterized simply as "those who keep the commandments of God and hold to the testimony of Jesus" (Rev 12:17; cf 14:12).

There is a richness to the variety of ways in which Jesus and the apostles speak of the Christian life. We need not fear the language of obedience if the apostles don't fear using it. We are commanded to believe, to obey, and to love. Why? Because we are subjects of our Lord and King.

A Mother's Story

My life was forever changed by the decision of a woman I have never met. A woman who found herself pregnant and for some reason I will never know, decided she was not ready to parent a child. I was born on November 20, 1969 and three days later a loving Christian couple picked me up at DFACS (Department of Family and Children Services) and paid \$255 to take me home. This was the time of closed adoption so my parents were given no information on my birthmother. They had moved to Atlanta from Montgomery, Alabama only a year before I was born for my dad to take a job with Delta Airlines. I often shudder to think what direction my life would have taken had they not moved to Atlanta. Sovereign act of God #1 in my life...before I was even born.

Adoption was talked about often in my family. My brother was adopted and I had twin cousins who were also adopted. I had an adopted child baby book and my mother faithfully wrote down every milestone in my life. My parents always told me I was handpicked by God for them. This made me feel proud and special so I never felt embarrassed or ashamed of being adopted. In fact I pitied the other kids whose parents were "stuck" with them because they came into their family the traditional way. I was thankful but didn't understand the full measure of grace that was on my life.

Jeff and I were both twenty-five when we married. According to my master plan I would start having children at age thirty. Age thirty arrived and family planning was not going as I had imagined and I needed to take control of the situation. Having a baby became my obsession

and my idol. I read books, I consulted doctors, I did everything....but pray to God. Well, actually I did pray, but it went something like this: "Give me a baby now! Don't you want me to have a baby? Why aren't you giving me a baby?" I didn't pray for God to calm my fears or give me direction or patience, or do his will. I was the elder woman in the Prodigal Pregnant Woman story. I lived a good life and regularly attended church. Why wasn't I being rewarded with a child? When a baby didn't come in the time frame that I had set, the praying stopped and I just grew angry. I came to church every Sunday with a smile on my face—when in fact I hated being there. I was mad at God and jealous of any woman who had children. Holidays were torture, Mother's Day almost impossible to bear. But still, I wouldn't relent to God's control.

When we started attending I.P.C., we sat with John and Pat Toler each week. Sovereign act of God # 2. We learned that John was chairman of the local advisory board of Covenant Care. They invited us to the spring banquet where we heard beautiful stories of adoption. We submitted the paperwork and passed background checks and were on the list only five months when we got a call that we had been chosen by a birthmother. On day five of the lawful ten day waiting period, our birthmother changed her mind. We were devastated. Soon after this heartbreak Jeff broke his ankle, lost his job and his father was diagnosed with lung cancer, which he eventually succumbed to. hindsight, the of a loss of job was a blessing for Jeff. He was able to be with his father and help him through treatments and he leaned on God

for support. What did my husband do when he was in the depths of despair? He read his Bible and prayed faithfully. He grew in knowledge and sanctification. Sovereign act of God #3...He provided a Christian husband that prayed for me when I wouldn't pray for myself.

We took a year off from adoption after all this tragedy. We updated our profile and settled back to wait. The birthdays kept coming and hopelessness really set in. What birthmother would choose a forty-two year old couple who had been married eighteen years? I had resigned myself to being childless but would I ever be truly happy again? I had lived with this anger against God for so long that I knew no other way.

On Friday July 6, 2012, we received a call from Covenant Care that we had been selected by birthparents. baby was due in three weeks and they wanted to meet us immediately. The weekend was restrained jubilation. We were keenly aware that the birthmother could change her mind. Sunday night July 8, we were at Point Pleasant, and after the service we both had messages from our caseworker. Our birthmother had given birth to a baby girl born at 1:00 that afternoon. She was three weeks early. We paused, fearing that in the emotion of childbirth she had changed her mind and wanted to keep the baby. The birthparents still wanted to meet us that week. Our birthparents are courageous people who selflessly decided that they could not parent a child at their young age. Sovereign act of God #4....He placed adoption on the heart of these birthparents who had many other options.

Day nine of the ten-day waiting

period came and we finally broke down and bought some basics for a diaper bag and borrowed a car seat from a neighbor. Birthmothers have until midnight on day nine, so I knew we were still not out of danger. Calls have come to other adoptive couples at that last hour so I knew not to celebrate too early. We received text messages at midnight from friends and family sending congratulations. I was thrilled, but my heart was breaking for my birthmother. The stroke of midnight meant something entirely different for her

Early the next morning we drove to Macon and we still had not decided on a name. I wanted a double name, in true Southern tradition. Jeff wanted something that would forever remind our new baby girl of her adoption. Ruth, a young Moabite girl who is plucked from a pagan society and into a devout Jewish family. God used the womb of Ruth and those of Tamar and Rahab, not of pure lineage, to perpetuate the lineage of the greatest gift of all...the Messiah. From the womb of a complete stranger and foreigner comes our precious gift, Ruth Anne. Amazing things come from unlikely sources.

When we returned home later that afternoon our home had been transformed. The Barrett and Brown families had stocked us with every essential a new family would need and a hot meal was ready to eat. Sovereign act of God #5...providing us with selfless Christian friends.

I'm sure you are hoping for a perfect ending to this story. We bring Ruth Anne home and magically all is perfect. In those first few months, I was mostly in a daze wondering what I had gotten myself into. I had two weeks to prepare and it was much harder than I had bargained for. Two and half years later I still ask myself that when, at the age of forty five, I fall asleep from exhaustion soon after Ruth Anne goes to bed. when I have to use reading glasses to see dosage instructions on a Children's Tylenol bottle. But then Ruth Anne starts singing "God is so Good" and I think to myself....yes.....God is so good. Why has it taken me this long to figure this out? So, I'm working towards sanctification each day and have learned a few short lessons I'd like to share.

Lesson 1. Making an idol out of worldy things is toxic. On more than one occasion, Jeff told me that having a baby had become my idol. He assured me that when God did bless us with a baby my life was not going to instantly become better. He was right.

Lesson 2. If God has the power to do all, why do we act like He can't? I am admittedly a control freak and handing over anything to anybody, including God, is difficult for me to do. I haven't conquered this one yet.

Lesson 3. God is Sovereign even when your life circumstances say otherwise. Ruth Anne is not Plan B for us...she is Plan A. We realize that, looking in hindsight.

Lesson 4. Supporting Christian adoption is a strong stance for the prolife movement. Consider adopting a child who needs a Christian home or support Covenant Care through your gifts and talents. The birthmothers who seek help through Covenant Care are welcomed with Christian love and support.

Lesson 5. Ruth Anne's adoption is a forever reminder of God's adoption of us in Christ. As you watch Ruth Anne grow up, don't view her as "the lucky little girl who was plucked from potential hardship." View her as a living reminder of the grace of God who has plucked you from the hardship of this world to be His sheep.

In almost any field, 80% is a staggering number. If a realtor closed eight out of of ten sales, they'd be phenomenal. If a baseball player hit eight out of ten pitches, he'd be the world's richest baseball player. We have a foundation attached to our business that basically gives money away for a living, and I don't close eight out of ten of the charities I take to lunch.

Coastal Jail Ministries, however, introduces men in jail to Christ. They host the introduction via the Word of God, and they let Jesus do the rest. The result is that a minimum of 80% of men who go through their program never see the inside of a jail again. They are so good at what they do, one simply wants to mass-scale the program to every jail, prison, juvenile detention center, and halfway house in America. First, though, we must finish working in our own backyard.

Every year Coastal Jail Ministry hosts a golf tournament, and this year it will be at the newly renovated Bacon Park Golf Club on May 18. A golfer may pay the \$100 entrance fee or raise \$400 in sponsorships. If you do not golf, please prayerfully consider helping to sponsor a golfer that we may continue to bring to Christ these men and women who so desperately need Him.

PSALM 127

"Psalm 127 covers three areas of human activities and potential anxiety—the house, the city (1) and the family (3-5) —and affirms that without the Lord we can do nothing. Verses 1–2 seem to suggest 'Leave it all to God; let go and let God', and enjoy a restful life. But in the Bible, the opposite of rest is not work but restlessness, and 3–5 add a corrective. The Lord has ordained the human activities of begetting, conceiving and bearing. Yet, the Bible insists, it is not human but divine agency that 'opens the womb' or, indeed, 'closes' it (Gen 29:31;30:2). Children are not our achievement but his gift (3). So is a completed house and a guarded city (1–2). All life must be lived to the full, all its joys enjoyed and its duties performed in unworried reliance on him who is the doer of all. Joyful activity, toilsome activity—but full of untroubled rest."

bortion. . .the death of millions of babies every year! Why do we just not think about it? There is so much we can do to help fight the cause! One of the many ways is going to Washington, D.C. for the annual March for Life. I have been blessed to participate in the march in Washington, D.C., for the past four years. I know sometimes it can get a bit discouraging when we go every year and we don't see much change, but in reality, change is not always something that happens all at once; change happens one person at a time. Over the years, my neighbor has seen our family foster many babies for a Christian adoption agency and talk about going to the March for Life. Because of this, she has since become pro-life, with no exceptions!! That just shows that our actions do affect others!

This year, I was able to witness the crazy sight of pro-abortion protesters trying to block the way towards the Supreme Court. Eight of the protestors were arrested! Their choice of clothing was extreme and inappropriate and

scared my younger sister. After the march, my father was approached by a homosexual man who claimed to be sympathetic to our cause, but asked the question, "Why do you bring your children to a protest wearing signs that are your opinions?" My dad explained that children form their opinions by many things, but mainly by their parents. He then asked this man his opinion on when life begins. 



The Parables of Jesus
