OUR PRIMARY IDENTITY

Years ago a promising young sportsman was identified as the next dominant multi-sport athlete. Through lower and middle school he excelled all his rivals in whatever competition he entered. He was popular with the boys and girls alike. High School coaches eagerly awaited his arrival.

As he stood on the cusp of athletic achievement, he was cut down by a serious injury. Then another. And another. His dreams were shattered. So also was his identity. Who was he? He used to know who he was. He was an athlete, *the* athlete. He was popular. He knew where he belonged. He knew where he fit in, where he was secure, atop the social pyramid. No more. Now he watches others achieve. Athletes he once dominated now excel, as he watches on the sideline. They progress. He is left behind.

He began to look for a place to rest. A crisis of identity spawns a crisis of belonging. The athletes were busy with their teams, and had little time for him. He casts about for a place to associate. Where could he hang out? He wasn't brilliant. He couldn't keep pace with the scholars. He wasn't a musician or an actor. He wasn't a "nerd." He wouldn't fit in with any of them. Where would he be accepted?

There was one place. The "partiers," as they are benignly (and misleadingly) referred to, would take him in. The only qualification was that one had to party with them. Party-up, and you're in. All dopers and drinkers are welcome. Slowly he began to hang out with them. First this happened only during school hours. As he became more comfortable with them, and they with him, it extended to after school hours, and; inevitably, to their after school activities. First he began to drink. Then over drink. Then drunkenness became the norm.

Then he began to experiment with dope. First a single puff. Then a periodic "drag." Before long he became a regular. He even would leave school grounds at lunch time with his buddies and smoke a joint or two, returning to class on time but with bloodshot eyes and traces of burnt hemp clinging to his clothing. Compounding the

tragedy of this young man is this: he was reared in a Christian home and in a strong Christian church.

What happened? The failure of our mythical young man is multi-layered, and blame can be placed in several areas. However one important element is that of identity. How did he identify himself during his years of popularity? As an athlete. What is the problem with this? An identity rooted in the transient is itself transient. Once a transient identity is uprooted, by injury, by financial loss, by divorce, by social rejection, one is "at sea," drifting and vulnerable.

What is our primary identity? It is that we are disciples of Christ. Read the introductions to the Apostles' letters. How do they identify themselves? It is always in relation to Christ, either as an apostle of Christ Jesus (1 & 2 Cor, Eph, Col, 1 & 2 Tim; 1 & 2 Pet), a bond-servant of Christ (Rom, Phil, Titus, Jas, Jude, 2 Pet), or a prisoner of Christ (Philemon). They are *defined* by their relation to Christ. They retain the other components of their identities. For example, the Apostle Paul is a Roman citizen, and will appeal to Caesar for his rights (Acts 25:11). He is a Pharisee, and will appeal to fellow Pharisees for support (Acts 23:6). He will appeal to his worldly identity and achievements when he needs to do so, especially for the sake of the gospel (2 Cor 11:22).

However, his primary identification is that he is a Christian disciple. The rest, his nationality, his group identity, his scholarship, his other admired achievements are all expendable. He regards them as "rubbish" (Phil 3:4-8). We'll see next time that understanding identity is crucial both for one's understanding of one's security and one's decisions. "Who am I?" is one crucial question that I must answer if I am to realize the fullness of the Christian life.

VERITAS GRADUATION

Veritas Academy has a unique relationship with Independent Presbyterian Church. It has been meeting in our facilities since 1999, that is, for a total of 13 years. It shares not only our space, which we are pleased to see utilized during the week, but also our theology, as it anchors itself to the *Westminster Confession of Faith* and *Catechisms*.

Veritas' influence is spreading. Among the surprising developments of the past school year is the announcement of a new classical school in Savannah, The Habersham School. It will offer a full school day, a broader theological foundation (the Apostles' Creed rather than the Westminster Standards), and will be meeting at our daughter church, Grace Church of the Islands. Some of our members are involved and we wish them well. Word on the streets is that there is a public "classical" school in the works as well.

The following is Dr. David Gobel's welcoming address at the Commencement, which we thought you might enjoy. Veritas Rhetoric School (the upper or high school) began meeting at St. John's Episcopal Church since 2009. Its first graduation ceremony was held in our sanctuary on May 31. We congratulate Veritas Academy on achieving this milestone.

WELCOME TO THE FIRST ANNUAL VERITAS RHETORIC SCHOOL COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

On behalf of the Board of Directors of Veritas Academy and Veritas Rhetoric School, welcome to our first annual Commencement Exercises. My name is David Gobel and I am a charter member of both boards—I also happen to be the father of one of today's graduates. I should mention as well that though this is our first commencement ceremony, it is our second graduating class. The first consisted of two graduates, who were recognized during last year's awards' ceremony. Together, these eight graduates are striking evidence that Veritas has succeeded in fulfilling its mission, to assist Christian parents in educating their children.

The six young ladies processing this afternoon are, indeed, a well educated lot. Most of them have studied Latin from the 3rd to the 8th grades, French for another two years and Greek for the past couple of years. They've read Dante's *Divine Comedy* in its entirety; they can discourse readily about Plato, Aristotle and Thomas Aquinas. They've studied formal logic and rhetoric. They've memorized hymns, poems, and lengthy passages of scripture. Some of them have memorized the entire

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Westminster Shorter Catechism. They can and will debate you, if you're so inclined, about principles of Christian worship or Jonathan Edwards' view on aesthetics. They know each other very well: they've played volleyball together and, last year, they travelled to Greece and Rome together.

But I know them well enough to tell you that they're neither geniuses nor angels. They are, rather, fine young women: poised, confident, smart and gracious. They have a variety of talents and are accomplished in a variety of skills, including: singing, acting, drawing, painting, classical ballet, piano, sewing and babysitting. They are fundamentally well-rounded, contributing members of this community; they are active members of their churches and their families.

For the sake of clarity, let me mention something that they are not. They are *not* "products" of Veritas Academy; or, at least, we don't see it that way. Veritas, as many of you know, is a Classical, Christian and Covenantal school. It meets for a limited time each weekday of the school year and offers a limited array of classes and an even more limited set of extracurricular activities. Its purpose is to assist committed Christian parents in educating their covenant children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Veritas is an intentionally modest venture; it's not glossy, neatly packaged or fully-programmed; it eschews the bells and whistles that characterize so many of the educational initiatives of our day.

Veritas is a radically counter-cultural institution. It is purposely limited in its size, scope and reach. It is intentionally subservient to the home and the church. It meets in beautiful, but borrowed facilities; and sometimes, in coffee shops and public squares. These young ladies are not "products" of a packaged or "professional" educational program. They have not been institutionalized for long hours in segregated, suburban campuses surrounded by parking lots. No; they have been brought up in and are now active participants in connected, covenantal communities; in families and churches. They are not products of their school; they are Christian women who have successfully completed a course of study. We are gathered here this afternoon to celebrate their achievement even as we remember that all praise and glory belong the God who made them, who saved them and who continues to do a good work in them.

A BOOK REVIEW

A great read for summer (or anytime), an excellent wedding or anniversary gift: *The Meaning of Marriage* (Dutton, 2011) by Timothy Keller, with Kathy Keller.

This title kept coming up in conversations with young adults, both married and unmarried. So I decided to read it myself, and loved it. It struck a chord in many ways. In 236 pages and eight chapters, Timothy Keller, pastor of Redeemer Presbyterian Church in New York City, fleshes out the mystery of marriage and the power of the gospel. For all of us who seek to know and reflect Christ in our lives and in our marriages this is a powerful book, whether you're married or single. (Yes, there's a chapter on "singleness and marriage.") Keller addresses issues such as cohabitation or "isn't marriage just a piece of paper?" Here's just a taste:

From the book cover: "Based on the acclaimed sermon series by *New York Times* bestselling author Timothy Keller, this book shows everyone—Christians, skeptics, singles, longtime married couples, and those about to be engaged—the vision of what marriage should be according to the Bible.

"Modern culture would have you believe that everyone has a soul mate; that romance is the most important part of a successful marriage; that your spouse is there to help you realize your potential; that marriage does not mean forever, but merely for now; and that starting over after a divorce is the best solution to seemingly intractable marriage issues.

"All those modern-day assumptions are, in one word, wrong.

"Using the Bible as his guide, and coupled with insightful commentary from Kathy, his wife of thirty-six years, Timothy Keller shows that God created marriage to bring us closer to Him and to bring more joy into our lives. It is a glorious relationship that is also the most misunderstood and mysterious. With a clear-eyed understanding of the Bible, and meaningful instruction on how to have a successful marriage, *The Meaning of Marriage* is essential reading for anyone who wants to know God and love more deeply in this life."

And the first chapter, "The Secret of Marriage," begins with Ephesians 5:31-32, "*A man shall leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh. This is a profound mystery....*" and with these paragraphs:

"I'm tired of listening to sentimental talks on marriage. At weddings, in church, and in Sunday school, much of what I've heard on the subject has as much depth as a

Hallmark card. While marriage is many things, it is anything *but* sentimental. Marriage is glorious but hard. It's a burning joy and strength, and yet it is also blood, sweat, and tears, humbling defeats and exhausting victories. No marriage I know more than a few weeks old could be described as a fairy tale come true. Therefore, it is not surprising that the only phrase in Paul's famous discourse on marriage in Ephesians 5 that many couples can relate to is verse 32, printed above. Sometimes you fall into bed, after a long, hard day of trying to understand each other, and you can only sigh: 'This is all a profound mystery!' At times, your marriage seems to be an unsolvable puzzle, a maze in which you feel lost.

I believe all this, and yet there's no relationship between human beings, that is greater or more important than marriage....

The most painful, the most wonderful—this is the Biblical understanding of marriage, and there has never been a more important time to lift it up and give it prominence in our culture."
