SECOND ANNUAL COMMUNION SEASON

AUGUST 9 - 12

Our second annual “Communion Season” begins on Thursday, August 9 and continues through Sunday, August 12. Our preacher for this year’s season of intense emphasis will be Dr. Harry L. Reeder, III. There will be four services that will lead up to and include the observance of the Lord’s Supper on Sunday morning. Dr. Reeder will bring a series of messages on “With Christ at the Feasts” that will be Christ-centered and cross-centered that by God’s blessing will assist us in our preparation for the Lord’s supper.

One of the purposes of the Lord’s Supper is to help us remember the death of Jesus in our place. It was appointed by Him for this very purpose as He went to the cross to make atonement for our sins by His death and sufferings; and He asks us to remember His dying command, *do this in remembrance of Me*. This ordinance is a visible representation and commemoration of our Savior’s death and sufferings for His people which He will have continued until He comes again. Please pray that this “communion season” will be a time of revival for our congregation. We will begin each evening session with a meal from 5:30-6:30 p.m. The service will follow from 6:30-7:30 p.m. The Sunday services will meet at our regular times.

I refer you to the brochure for Dr. Reeder’s messages (see page 2). Please take time to read it. All sessions except Sunday evening will be held downtown. Dinner will precede the evening sessions from 5:30-6:30 in the Fellowship Hall. **Please use the reservation form in the bulletin or call the church office to make your reservations.**



Dr. Reeder serves as Senior Pastor of the 4,000-member Briarwood Presbyterian Church, birthplace of the PCA denomination. As a pastor/teacher, his philosophy of ministry is drawn from Ephesians 4:11-16: he is called to “equip the saints” to do “the work of the ministry.”

Beyond Briarwood, Pastor Reeder teaches leadership courses through Reformed Theological Seminary and mentors graduating seminarians as pastoral fellows. He is the author of *From Embers to a Flame: How God can Revitalize Your Church*.

Dr. Reeder is a graduate of Covenant College, with a degree in history and Bible. He holds a Master of Divinity degree from Westminster Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Reformed Theological Seminary. He and his wife, Cindy, have three children and six grandchildren.

Please be in prayer for these services that God will honor us by his presence and grant us an extraordinary time of blessing. You are encouraged to invite friends and neighbors to these services.

We strongly urge the entire congregation to set aside priority time for these services that we may be strengthened and encouraged by means of the ministry of the Word and Christian Fellowship.

IDENTITY & SECURITY

Who am I? I am a disciple of Christ, called by Him to Himself and called consequently “to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord,” that is, conduct life in a way that is consistent with, or compatible with, who Christ is and who we are in Christ (Col 1:10). This identity defines who I am and consequently how I believe, and even where I belong.

Otto Friedrich, in his book *Iron & Blood*, tells about an incident in his father’s childhood in Germany. When the time came for his tonsils to be removed the doctor approached him with his shiny stainless steel surgical scissors and asked, “Now are you a brave German boy or are you somebody who cries and has to be put to sleep?” “What did you answer?” Friedrich asks his father squeamishly. “I said I was a brave German boy and that was that.” Identity, as we can see, has much to say about behavior.

Winston Churchill’s matchless speeches of the World War II era often involved identity as a motivation for resistance. He referred in his post-Munich Pact speech to a recovery of the “moral strength and martial vigor” that would enable Britain to stand against moral evil, as it had so often in “olden times.” Had they not stood alone against the Spanish Armada, against Napoleon, and the Kaiser? “We shall never surrender” was an invocation of British identity, British courage, British determination to resist the forces of tyranny. We are British, and this is what we have always done, and what we will now do, whatever the cost.

Less eloquently, yet appealing to the same principle, Nikki Giovanni, an official at Virginia Tech University, encouraged a strong response to the campus massacre in April 2007 by repeating time and again, “We are Virginia Tech!” She invoked identity. Because we are, she urged, we will not allow this tragedy to defeat us, or deflect us from our mission.

The crisis of identity is also a crisis of belonging. Who am I? I am first and foremost a disciple of Christ, “in Christ” (a favorite New Testament designation). Where do I belong? I am a citizen of heaven (Phil 3:20), a member of the body of Christ (1 Cor 12; Rom 12), the church, the separated people of God (2 Cor 6:14-18). Who are we? We are a holy people called out of darkness and into God’s marvelous light (1 Pet 2:9-12), mocked (1 Pet 4:3-5), and hated by the world (Jn 15:18-25). We are fools for Christ’s sake (1 Cor 4:9-13), who in turn reject friendship with the world (Jas 4:4,5), who love not the world (1 Jn 2:15-17), who have fixed our minds on things above and not things below (Col 3:2; 2 Cor 4:18), who love our neighbors, love our enemies, and love one another (Mt

5:38-48). All of this (and much, much more) is wrapped up in our identity. Because of what Christ has done we have a new identity. We are the people of God. We stand in a long line of heroes and martyrs of faith, a “great cloud of witnesses” (Heb 11:1-12:1). Our identity plants us among a particular people and dictates a way of life consistent with our leader (Jesus) and His people all through the ages.

On the eve of USC–Notre Dame football games the ghosts of heroes and heroic exploits are resurrected in pep rallies, to remind present athletes and fans that our side wins at all times and against all odds. Notre Dame invokes Knute Rockne, the Gipper, and the Four Horsemen. USC hauls out the legendary Howard Jones, John McKay, Frank Gifford, Mike Garrett (we won’t mention O.J.), and the other Heisman winners. What’s the point of these rituals, repeated everywhere throughout the college football world? They are exercises in identity, in who we are. We are winners. We are big, tough, relentless, fleet of foot, defensive stone walls and offensive tidal waves. We never quit. We always prevail. What we have achieved *before we will again.*

I am not primarily a Johnson. I am not primarily a minister. I am not primarily an American. I am not primarily a Californian. I am not defined primarily by a given class, race, or social group. I’m not even my own person. I’ve been “bought with a price” (1 Cor 6:19,20). I’ve been crucified and I no longer live (Gal 2:20). I lost my life, having surrendered it to Christ (Mt 16:24,25). My life now belongs to Jesus.

Taken on their own terms, there is nothing wrong with any of the above sources of identity. However, I must never allow a secondary identity to overtake the primary. If I do so, I make an idol of that identity and open the door to all manner of trouble. Who am I? It’s simple. I am a Christian, a sinner saved by grace, a disciple of Christ.

WOMEN OF THE CHURCH—

A SETTLED HEART

It is likely that we would say we agree with C. S. Lewis when he reminds us, “God cannot give us happiness and peace apart from himself, because it is not there.” Yet, we can continue to put our hopes for happiness in other places, which must mean that we have some reservations about the idea. Looking for happiness where it cannot be found results in problems within ourselves and with others. As women, we can struggle throughout our lives with issues that may not need to be issues, if we could point ourselves in the right direction. It is an amazing, unchanging fact that Jesus is “the bread of life” and there is no substitute for him.

When women look for happiness in the wrong places, we are inevitably disappointed. Women, in their youth and older years alike, are commonly tempted to look for happiness in relationships and things. There are certain kinds of relationships that we want to have, and certain things that we want to possess. We believe in these things and in their power to deliver. We count on them and place our hope in them. If we can somehow obtain the objects of our desire, if we can look a certain way, or if we can have the relationships that we long for, we will be satisfied. But, of course, they do not deliver, and we are left with pain and struggle. If we do not resolve this heartache with the Lord, trouble may follow, as pain and disappointment can breed other problems. They do not just occupy our hearts benignly. They churn within us to our own harm and the harm of those around us. They can lead to an obsession with the outward appearance, which is a huge problem in our culture. Our thinking is that if we look better and try harder we will get the attention that we want. We might begin comparing ourselves with others and resent and blame them for what we do not have. Jealousy and ill will may grow with the possibility that relationships will be damaged. We suffer and we cause other people to suffer when we have misplaced desires.

C.S. Lewis explains that it is impossible for God to give us happiness apart from himself, because that is not how we were made. Lewis confirms that, “God designed the human machine to run on Himself... That is why there is no good asking God to make us happy in our own way.” The creator is the designer. We cannot ask God to do something that goes against his design. We cannot ask

God to make an exception for us. When will we come to favor his design over our own ways? When will we hope in him and count on him? When will we have confidence that he can deliver? When will we eat of the true bread and be satisfied?

Christian women were made to reflect the beauty of the Lord. Complaining, jealousy, and strife do not become us. Neglect of inward qualities along with an obsession with outward appearance is not the path to take. We were made for better things. Virtue is possible for us because of our virtuous God. His life in us can make us what we are not without him. We can be kind and gracious. We can be glad for the blessings that others enjoy.

When we are disappointed we can hope in God; we can count on him and he will deliver. When we know where to look for happiness and satisfaction we will have a settled heart. A settled heart is free; it is free to find the abundant life. It is free from self-centered pursuits to be a blessing and not a burden to others. Scripture centers on and points to our Lord Jesus. If we do the same, we are headed in the right direction.

PSALM 133

Based on *Scottish Psalter* 1650

A "song of Ascents" (songs sung by pilgrims on their journey to Jerusalem at festival time), this Psalm celebrates the rich fellowship enjoyed by like-minded pilgrim believers. The "precious oil" of verse 2 and the "dew of Hermon" in verse 3 are both elements that refresh the weary. Harmony among believers does this: it refreshes, revitalizes, strengthens. The KJV added this explanatory heading: "The benefit of the communion of saints."

The fourteenth "song of Ascents" is a prayer by the pilgrim for unity and refreshing fellowship among those worshipping at Zion.

- 2 For it is like the precious oil

That, going down upon his beard,
