Sowing and Reaping

Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. (Gal 6:7, 8 KJV)

ertainly John 14:6 has had the decisive influence on the direction of my life (See September Messenger). Yet there have been a number of other milestones along the way where a verse or a passage jolted me from my spiritual slumbers and drove me forcefully in a direction I had not anticipated.

The preacher of my youth, Martin Van Buren Canavan IV, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dominguez in the Long Beach/Carson area of Southern California, thundered the above verses in the King James Version at a time when I needed to hear them. I can't place the time precisely. I was probably a preteen or an early teenager. "God is not mocked," he shouted in the course of his sermon. That "word" struck me. It was the first of many self-authenticating encounters with Scripture that would characterize my spiritual pilgrimage. I knew that because God is God, it must be true. He will not be mocked. We don't get away with anything. We mustn't kid

ourselves. "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." We will reap exactly what we sow. God will see to it. He will ensure it. Sow the Spirit and reap eternal life, or sow the flesh and reap corruption and eternal death.

I needed to know that truth as a tween–teen–ager. I was observing my friends getting increasingly worldly and given to excess. I saw myself as part of a decreasing minority of "straights." Thoughts passed through my mind about whether I was right to follow the path my family and church had laid out before me. My preacher's words hit me, or should I say, flooded me with conviction and certainty. God is God. He is not One with whom to be trifled ("messed with" is probably how I expressed it back then).

In conjunction with this, I have a clear memory of the most important sermon of my youth. It may have been part of the same message. It was entitled "The Unfunny Joke." My pastor talked about how Hollywood teaches us to laugh at sin. The funny drunk; he's the life of the party. Look at him stumble around. Listen to him slur his speech. Isn't he hilarious?

Then there is the funny off-color joke. We wink and nod knowingly at the double-entendre. We all laugh at the veiled references, and not so veiled

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references to erotic intimacies. It's all so funny. Ha-Ha-Ha. We get it. We're so sophisticated, so clever.

But, he said, come to our Skid Row mission and meet the medical doctor who is lying in the gutter in his own vomit, his career ruined, his marriage destroyed, his family devastated, and tell us how funny drunkenness is. Come to my office and counsel a sixteen-year-old girl who is pregnant out of wedlock and tell us how funny sex is. On and on he went with devastating clarity exhorting us to flee

immorality, to flee sin, and to pursue holiness. God, indeed, will not be mocked.

These themes had much to do with keeping me out of trouble at a time when so many of my peers were spiraling out of control. I needed to hear those warnings. I needed to hear about consequences. I believed John 14:6 with all my heart. I believed in salvation by faith and not works. Yet I needed a strong dose of biblical realism. Many voices today brush aside this kind of message as "law" or "moralism," thinking to invalidate exhortative preaching as they do. What I'm saying is, I needed to hear

Galatians 6:6, 7, and I needed to hear it without equivocation, without it being explained away, and without it dying to death of a thousand qualifications. I suppose that God put those verses in His Bible *because we all need to hear them.* I will always be grateful for a preacher who not only preached the gospel (every week, complete with altar call), but also preached the Bible's warnings. I needed both, and I suspect you do as well.

WHY ARE WE PRO-LIFE?

rganizations for life carry out their lifesaving mission by promoting respect for the worth and dignity of every individual human being. This includes all unborn children from conception to birth; persons with disabilities; older physically weak people, and those vulnerable people who cannot defend themselves. All these areas of concern include abortion, infanticide, euthanasia, assisted suicide, and the killing of unborn children for stem cells.

The National Right to Life and other organizations work to achieve their mission through education, legislation and political action. Their activities include providing research, educational materials, information and leadership training for effective right-to-life citizenship. They also sponsor legislation to advance the protection of human life and support the election of those who defend life.

All people are encouraged to join in this great cause with the National Right to Life. A nationwide network of 50 affiliated state groups, thousands of community chapters, hundreds of thousands of members and millions of individual supporters all across the country act on the information they receive from the NRTL. Their mission is to protect and defend the most fundamental right of humankind, the right to life of every innocent human being from the beginning of life to natural death. The sixth commandment always defends life. "Thou shalt not kill."

America's first document as a new nation, The Declaration of Independence, states that we are all "created equal" and endowed by our Creator "with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life..." Our Founding Fathers emphasized the preeminence of the right to "Life" by citing it first among the unalienable rights of this nation.

In 2008 I became concerned about the tragic growth of abortion more than ever before because of the election of the most pro-abortion U.S. President. This President was a man who was strongly in favor of government expansion across the board, especially the federal government. The government could fund abortion with a national healthcare act, commonly called the Affordable Health Care Act, which was signed by President Obama in March 2010.

I called the strongest pro-life leader I knew, Nellie Gray, the president of the March for Life in Washington, D.C. I wanted to know what the most paramount thing a pro-life grass roots organization could do to stop abortion on demand. She turned down the TV at her abode and immediately said, "John, we have to educate and re-educate people and all our elected representatives at the national level." I asked her if this was feasible in light of the 2008 election.

Nellie said, "We must re-educate our country to defend those who cannot defend themselves."

I also asked her about the preparation for the up-coming March for Life. She said in November 2008 the preparations were on schedule. The March would have all the safe-laid plans for all the people in attendance, not only for the Rally (speakers in the pro-life movement) but also for the march to the Supreme Court.

Our group from IPC and friends from other churches once again attended the

March for Life. We met and spoke with the staff of our two Senators and our House members. Sometimes we have felt like apostles, or shall we say, early Christians, talking to unbelievers about the gospel.

Through it all, our Senators and Congressmen are without excuse. They are all aware that life begins at conception, and they know we are holding them responsible for how they vote on important life issues. We will never become weary with this issue and will continue to voice our concerns and always stress the importance of overturning the Roe v. Wade decision of 1973.

Right to life really is a discourse at the national, state, and local levels. We are the leaders of this national conversation on law being made at all levels, which has to be maintained for Roe v. Wade to ever be overturned. Unborn lives have been saved through God's hand, blessing our efforts.

A report released February 3, 2014 by the Guttmacher Institute found that abortion rates and ratios are continuing to decline in the United States. Public debate over the rights of unborn children seems to be playing a role in this trend.

The battle for life will be won only through active pro-life churches whose pastors proclaim pro-life gospel preaching, and by how their members respond to the message of the word of God.

According to the Scriptures, life begins at conception rather than at the time of delivery or at some arbitrary point during gestation. PsaIm139:13-16

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indicates that God knew the writer of these verses while he was yet unformed. In Jeremiah1: 4-5, there was an indication that God knew Jeremiah before he was born and had a special purpose for his life. This is one of several biblical passages that indicate a continuum of life that starts before birth and continues after death. In the book of Exodus, chapter 21, verses 22-24, it is quite clear that God considers the life of the unborn to be just as valuable as the life of an adult. When you link this belief with the commandment to "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39), it becomes clear that we should be helping women who find themselves in a tough place with an unplanned pregnancy.

As we work to save the unborn we are helping change the value for all innocent life. You may not see change in our finite perception of time, but look at the history of slavery. Just like slavery, this issue of life will take a lifetime to correct. May the old, middle aged and young, all have active gospel hearts to protect the unborn.

The innocent need your help by praying for them, by being part of the national debate on abortion, and by attending the March for Life bus trip January 21-23, 2015.

Psalm 146

The last five psalms begin and end with the word, "Hallelujah," or "praise the Lord" and so have been called the "Great Hallel," bringing the psalter to a close with a crescendo of praise. Psalm 146 praises the Lord's reign, particularly the blessing that it will be for the weak and vulnerable, for those typically denied their rights or protection, who are exploited and oppressed.

Contrasted with man's role (vv 3,4) the rule of God means provision for each at precisely the point of need: justice for the oppressed, food for the hungry, freedom for the prisoners, sight for the blind, help for those bowed down, for the sojourner, for the widow, the fatherless, the righteous; and it means ruin for the wicked. Israel caught a glimpse of righteous rule in its virtuous kings, such as David, Solomon, and Josiah. Their rule pointed forward to the greater than David, Jesus Christ, in whom the rule of God will be realized. (1 Cor 15:23ff; Rev 4ff)
