PREACHING THE POINT

What is the meaning of Psalm 1? The psalmist describes the "blessed man" as one who, on the positive side, meditates on the law of God day and night, becomes like a tree planted by streams of water, and bears fruit and prospers. On the negative side, he doesn't walk, stand, or sit with the ungodly.

There is a school of preaching, called "redemptive-historical," that has done much good in restoring "Christ-centered" preaching to our pulpits. I know something about Christcentered preaching, I've written on the subject (see my The Parables of Jesus, chapter 2, "The Bible is About Jesus," pp 29-39; and also The Case for Traditional Protestantism, chapter 3, "Solo Christo," pp 47-74). More importantly, I have devoted Sunday mornings for the last 26 years to Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and Acts, the latter of which the "glorious physician" bills as "all that Jesus continued to do and teach" (Acts 1:1). Once every 3-4 years I've interrupted my gospels & Acts preaching to do an epistle. Otherwise, nearly all of my Sunday morning preaching for a quarter of a century has been devoted to what Jesus did and taught, from right out of gospel texts. Calvin taught me this pattern of ministry. I concur with those who emphasize that "nothing but Jesus Christ and Him crucified" is the message of "all the Scriptures" (1 Cor 2:2; Lk 24:27).

However, the disciples of this school do what many disciples do: they go too far. Let me cite some examples — they typically will preach Psalm 1 as "Jesus is the Blessed Man." The problem with this is that Psalm 1 is not about Jesus. The first Psalm is the "gateway" psalm teaching us the rewards of Bible study and meditation. It is a wisdom Psalm that exhorts and encourages us to be students of the psalter specifically and of all Scripture more generally. One might want to show in one's sermon how Jesus is the best illustration of what it means to be this blessed man, though because the New Testament never portrays Jesus meditating on Scripture that might be a problem. Still, Jesus learned the Bible somewhere (in the synagogue probably) and used it mightily in battle with His foes (e.g. Mt 4:1ff; 21:33-34; 22:23-40; etc.). A preacher might also want to demonstrate that Jesus is the central message of that Scripture upon which Psalm 1 would have us meditate. However, the point of the Psalm is the importance of *our* meditating upon Scripture. To make "Jesus is the blessed man" the point is to miss the point, however true it might be. What difference does it make? We always miss out when we make the point of a passage something other than that which the Holy Spirit was intending when He inspired its inclusion in the canon.

Let's take another example, the "Beatitudes" (Mt 5:3ff). What is the meaning of the Beatitudes? Some redemptive-historical preachers tell us that the point of Matthew 5:3-12 is that Jesus is the Beautific One. The Beatitudes are about the character of Jesus. Note, they are not saying merely that Jesus is the best illustration of the Beatitudes. That is a perfectly valid and important point to make. Neither are they merely saying that Jesus alone can transform us so that we may become characterized by the Beatitudes. This too is an important point that should and must be made. I say both of these things in Grace Transformed, my book on the Beatitudes (e.g. pp 25-35, 104-108, 139ff, etc.). No, they say that the point is that Jesus' life embodies the Beatitudes. He teaches the Beatitudes so that we'll notice that they are His characteristics. He alone fulfills them, and don't miss this point, we no longer have to fulfill them because He has done so on our behalf.

I say, to make that *the* point is to miss the point. The Beatitudes are set in Matthew 5-7, the largest single portion of ethical teaching found in the four gospels. Jesus there is teaching His disciples the ethics or character of the kingdom of God. Jesus is the best model of the ideals, and Jesus alone enables us to realize them in our own experience. Yet, *the* point of these ideals is that we are to aspire to embody them ourselves not that Jesus fulfills these ideals for us.

One more example: the Good Samaritan. These preachers will say that the point of the parable is that "Jesus is the Good Samaritan." Again, they are not saying merely that Jesus best illustrates the Good Samaritan, a valid and important point to make. Neither are they saying merely that we cannot become

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like the Good Samaritan without the grace of the Holy Spirit, another necessary and vital emphasis. Indeed, I make both of these points in my book on The Parables of Jesus (302-307), and again recently in our sermon series on Luke's gospel. No, they say the point is that Jesus is the Good Samaritan who fulfills the ideals of the parable on our behalf. Because of the "finished work of Christ" we are liberated from the burden of being Good Samaritans, which we could never be because of our sin. This, I say, is to miss the point, which is this case Jesus makes explicit: "You go, and do likewise" (Lk 10:37). The point of the parable is the one Jesus makes. We are to love our neighbors as ourselves, which means to behave towards our neighbors as did the Good Samaritan.

The problem with the redemptive-historical extremists is three-fold. First, the ethical thrust of the New Testament, which is not inconsiderable, disappears. All preaching becomes about Jesus and the cross, that is, about justification by faith. Everything else is a footnote to justification. As a consequence, preaching becomes predictable, cliché, and boring. Flights of redemptive-historical fancy become commonplace, as texts are twisted to say what they do not say, forced to teach what they do not teach, while what they do teach is lost.

This latter comment is our second issue with the extremes of redemptive-historical preaching. The reason why the Holy Spirit gave particular passages to the church vanishes in the "grand narrative" as the plan of redemption is rehearsed. Not only do indicatives swallow-up imperatives, but critical themes regarding God, creation, providence, the Holy Spirit, the fight of faith, and so on, are muted, and the people of God lose the lesson that God intended from the text itself.

Third, all non-redemptive-historical preaching comes under the sharp criticism of the movement's more enthusiastic disciples. Unless they hear the preacher repeating the redemptive-historical formulas, they'll accuse him of "moralism" or legalism or worse. Some of them even disparage "application" as "law" or at least something other than gospel, which they limit to the announcement of what Jesus has done, period. For them even the call to repentance is "law." As I noted at the outset, I've spent most of the last 26 years of Sunday mornings preaching on what Jesus said and did straight from the gospels and Acts. In my case (not to get defensive about it) I have read the best of the modern evangelical scholars who've written the Gospels and Acts (e.g. Leon Morris, I. H. Marshall, F. F. Bruce, D. A. Carson, John Stott, etc.), as well as the older Reformed commentators (e.g. Calvin, Matthew Henry, J. C. Ryle), and quoted and footnoted these sources in my sermon manuscripts to show that my interpretation is that of the best evangelical and Reformed thinkers, past and present. How can one get more Christ-centered than that? No matter. Redemptive-historical devotees still are not satisfied. They will say: "You can preach out of the gospels and still not be Christ-Centered"!? This illustrates how narrowly they construct their concept of "Christ-centered." One can preach every Sunday for decades (with time out for sermons on the incarnation and resurrection for Christmas and Easter) from Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and Acts, and they're still not satisfied. It has been said by redemptive-historical zealots of the best preachers in the PCA (you would know their names) that they "don't preach the gospel!"

The task of the preacher is to preach his text, not pull Christ out of the text like a magician pulling a rabbit out of a hat. Of course all Christian preachers should establish where his text stands in light of Christ and interpret it accordingly. Our Richmond Hill church planter states this principle in relation to preaching from the four gospels as well as I've seen it put: Regarding Jesus' ethical teaching, he says, we must not "miss the Savior who is heading to the cross to make all of His teaching powerfully effective in the lives of His redeemed and forgiven people." Still faithful preachers are to honor the purpose of the author in *writing* the text and the Holy Spirit in *inspiring* the text by preaching its message first and foremost, by making its point his point.

We are privileged to participate in this meal until the Lord comes again. When Christ instituted the Lord's Supper, he instructed his disciples to carry on this ordinance "in remembrance" of him.

Please pray that this "communion season" will be a time of revival for our congregation. We will begin each evening session with a meal from 5:30-6:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. The service will follow from 6:30-7:30 p.m. The Sunday services will meet at the regular times. All sessions except Sunday evening will be held downtown. Psalm 35 Summary

"They hated without a cause," Jesus explained to His disciples, citing Psalm 35:19 in order to explain to His disciples the world's hatred of Him (John 15:25; cf Psalm 69:4, Psalm 109:3). "Lord, how long?" the Psalmist cries amidst afflictions suffered at the hands of his enemies (verse 17). Yet he is confident that his vindication will come (verses 27,28). While we must "take heed to applying it to any little peevish quarrels and enmities of our own," as Matthew Henry says, yet we may comfort ourselves with its hope of vindication for the righteous, and for the whole kingdom of God.

"This Psalm belongs to a time when enmity and suffering were seemingly endless," says Motyer. David endured an extended period of time where a gap persisted between the promises of God (of Israel's throne, an enduring dynasty and accompaning honors) and present realities (persecution, flight, false accusations, unjustified hostility). David prays, but the answer is deferred. Prayer alone is the solution to the crisis, but by prayer we both "submit our needs to the Lord's resources and also our timetable to His."

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CHARLES SIMEON ON SANCTIFICATION

From the passage before us, we may in the next place, offer a reproof to those who would abuse the Gospel. We have already acknowledged, and with deep grief we confess it, that there are some persons professedly of Antinomian principles, who are so occupied with contemplating what Christ has wrought out for them, that they cannot bestow a thought on what he has engaged to work in them. To speak of holiness, or any point of duty, they account low, and legal: yea, they think that Christ has by his own obedience to the law superseded the necessity of holiness in us; and that the whole work of salvation is so finished by him, that there remains nothing to be done by us, nothing of repentance for sin, nothing of obedience to God's commands, but solely to maintain confidence in the provisions of God's everlasting Covenant, and to rejoice in God as our God and portion.

Shocking as these sentiments are, they have been professed of late to a great extent; and many have been deceived by them: but, to show how unscriptural they are, we need only refer to the character of David, as drawn in the words of our text: Does he discard the law as a rule of life? Does he pour contempt upon the precepts of God as unworthy of his notice? No: throughout all his Psalms he speaks of them as objects of his supreme delight: "O how I love thy law! all the day long is my study in it" (Ps 119:97). "I love thy precepts above gold; they are sweeter to me than honey and the honey-comb" (Ps 19:9-11). To the same effect St. Paul also speaks: "I consent unto the law that it is good" (Rom 7:16), and again, "I delight in the law of God after the inward man!" (Rom 7:22).

... It is our privilege, doubtless, to trace all our mercies up to his everlasting love, and to view them all as secured to us by covenant and by oath: but then it is no less our privilege to fulfil God's will, and to resemble the holy angels, of whom it is said, that "they do his commandments, hearkening to the voice of his word." Beware then lest ye ever be led off from this ground. Rejoice in the Lord Jesus Christ, as the propitiation for your sins, as your all-prevailing Advocate, and as your living Head: but, whilst you believe in him, and love him, and rejoice in him, let your faith, and love, and joy, stimulate you to a holy and unreserved obedience. If he has "set your heart at liberty," let the effect be to "make you run with more enlargement the way of his commandments."
